The <u>Enabling Accessibility Fund Youth Innovation Component</u> is looking for youth volunteers to create greater awareness about accessibility needs and encourage organizations to apply for funding to address existing accessibility barriers.

The <u>Social Development Partnerships Program – Disability: Building a stronger</u> <u>foundation for leadership of youth with disabilities</u> funds partnerships between national disability organizations and groups that actively engage youth.
